4.1	Chair	Catherine Marley

I'd like to start off by congratulating those who received Adult Recognition Awards on August 1st. The WF Waters awardees have all done a tremendous amount of service within Victorian Rovers, and the Commissioner's and Chairman's awards are well deserved. There were also heaps of rovers who received Special Service Awards and even some Meritorious Service Awards for their work as rovers or as leaders of youth. It's great to see their hard work recognised.

I have been in conversations with multiple people about our situation with NRC. I am working towards a plan to bring more value to NRC and hopefully create a better working relationship with other BRCs. This will involve opening discussions about our financial status and potentially paying off our last instalment of last year's payment plan. This will gain us another year of NRC membership, as they have waived the levy this financial year. Future levies have been lowered due to budget changes, changing from \$7.69 per rover to \$5.30. These changes are a direct result of months of discussion between NRC and the last VRC team. As Eleanor mentioned at the most recent NRC meeting, our reasons for becoming non-financial no longer stand. We have recommenced events, regaining income, we have started a VRC levy to make this income more stable and the NRC levy has reduced by a significant margin, with NRC's budget undergoing cuts to focus on value for money. I will have more concrete plans next month. I just want to make sure everyone is aware of these ongoing discussions.

There have been a lot of exciting things happening behind the scenes, hopefully we will have some things to announce next month.

Budget Breakdown

Income

We are currently budgeting on a total of \$52,000 in income broken down across Mudbash, and other major events such as Stradbroke Cup, Laff, Plenty Valley and Cohen Shields.

As well as other general camping hirers.

We are currently in discussion with several new potential hirers which would increase our revenue for the budgeted year.

We are finding that most weeks are filling up which would lead to the park being fully booked throughout the year.

Unfortunately, we are still seeing the effects of Covid which may effect the park at any stage with government advice.

Expenditure

With the park opening to more booking this will raise the costings to run the park.

We are expecting an increase in the utilities type expenses as transport cost get larger ie Electricity and gas.

The main expenditure items include insurance 10K, repurchase of merch items as stocks have run out/getting low, electricity, costs to get the roads around the park redone as it has been several years since this has happened, and an allowance for future upgrade of things like tractors/motor vehicles.

Overall this should be a consolidating year as things return to normal.

Mafeking is a very large property and people can often forget what it costs to manage a property of this size. At the end of the day, we are extremely fortunate to be able to say we own and manage our own assets like this but will need the continued support of every Rover in Victoria if we want to call it OURS for many more years to come

Surfmoot

Theme to be announced Thursday 26th January - Sunday 29th January



Introduction

Surfmoot is considered one of the biggest major annual camps for Rovers. Usually held at Eumerella campsite, each year the event attracts around 400 Rovers for a 3 night camp over the Australia Day long weekend. There has been national presence in the past as well as Victorian. Like MARB and Mudbash, a different theme is chosen each year to add a little more to the event. This also gives participants the chance to partake in themed activities while onsite.

This year will be no different with a new theme already in the works we (the committee) believe will attract the most attention and get everyone excited for the upcoming event.

We are looking forward to running a great event and hope to see plenty of Rovers attend. We have already started working hard to plan a great weekend and look forward to seeing the final result.

Budget Breakdown

Income:

Ticketing

Tickets this year have managed to drop to \$80 for presold tickets and \$90 gate tickets.
 However, new rovers, service team, and committee will be able to get their tickets for just \$40. An option for 1 day tickets is also on offer for \$25 each.

General Store

- The budget for the general store is not contributing to any profit the event makes. The only line item that has been added to the general store is to zero out the expenditure for the set up of the merchandise listed in expenditure. This means any income made from the merchandise is profit.

Expenditure

Entertainment

- The overall budget for entertainment is down about \$1700 from last event's actuals but up compared to what was budgeted. This has been made possible by moving the campsite back to the front of Eumerella. We will also be changing the layout of entertainment this year by having it be a more chill environment under a marquee instead of with a stage.

Treasurer

- Overall costs have dropped significantly thanks to the lack of VRC appropriations for the event.

Activities

- The activities budget has been increased to a total of \$1500 in an effort to make the selection more interesting and gain more interest in attending the event.

Works and Services

- I have been informed there is a chance Euemerella will not pay for portaloos like I initially thought they would so have allocated \$1600 to pay for toilets and showers in the event we have to order the same number of portaloos as last year.
- There has been an added line item for a disabled portaloo to improve disabled access at the camp.
- Due to moving the whole event up the back of the campsite we require a few marquees and gazebos. The cost of hiring these will come out of the general supplies line item.
- The emergency services budget has been split up into first aid and fire team. First aid are charging \$0.50 per person to attend the event and the fire team charge \$200 for events of up to 500 participants.

Power and Comms

- The total budget allocated to power and comms has increased by around \$1000 in comparison to last year. This is due to the price of petrol skyrocketing and in general the price of hiring generators, PA, radios, and internet.

General Store

- The expenditure on the general store is lower than it was for the 2022 actuals. However, this is just to help zero out the income mentioned earlier as it is difficult to predict the actual expenditure for this event.
- The only actual expenditure that has been accounted for so far is the \$500 to cover hiring an extra freezer and fridge for the canteen since they won't be in the Environment Centre.

Venue

- The price of camping at Euemerella has been quoted to us as \$5 per person per night. Since the event will be 3 nights, I have equated it to be \$15 per person for the whole weekend.
- Since the committee and service team will be staying in huts, they are not included in the head count for the participants.

- The current quote for the buildings has managed to drop significantly to \$2,590.00 total. This is due to the decision being made to move the site back to where it has been in the last 2 years. This meant there was no need to pay for troop hall or HQ.
- The lodge is being hired out for 3 nights at the most so the committee can stay there before the camp starts and move into the Environment Centre huts later.
- The police scouters will not be returning to surfmoot this year to save on cost as well and will instead be replaced by a welfare team.
- Currently \$5 of each participant tickets sold are being used to pay for the Environment Centre and huts for the committee to stay in.

Closing Statement

The Surfmoot 2023 committee have already started working hard on this event. We have done our best to improve ticket prices in order to meet expectations that without VRC appropriations they will drop. This event has delivered and managed to drop ticket prices to \$80 per person. This is the lowest they have for a couple of years and still covers the 4 days and 3 nights event.

Scaled Summary

As seen in the attached scaled summary report, as our attendance increases, our profit margin also increases. The intention for this is to be reinvested back into the event, to make it bigger and better for all participants. The key areas of focus for reinvestment will be the entertainment and activities; as these are the main areas of value seen by our participants.

VRC Budget 2022-2023

- VRC operating budget is attached for endorsement by the VRC.
- Note, specific project spend is not Included as these will considered on a case by case basis and will be funded from reserves rather than the operating budget.

Income

- For 2023, primary income is budgeted to be sourced from Rover Levy as agreed by the VRC.
- Extranet currently has census figures of 1165 Rovers, and 84 RA's and Rover commissioners. 1249 @ \$15 per head.
- Assets have a budget of \$1000 each representing a share of income external to the Rover section received by the assets. This is in accordance with the levy paper.
- A small amount of interest is budgeted and is largely sourced from investments in the Scout Development fund.

Expenditure

- The VRC budget includes our contribution to the National Rover Council, for which there are three components. The NRC Levy, the Moot buddies Levy and the NRC Meeting attendance costs.
 - It is noted that the NRC levy is potentially waived for 2023, however there is ongoing discussion on NRC finances, and it is prudent to budget a contribution.
 - NRC levy has been calculated as 1165 Roversx(7.69*1.025)-\$2 (\$5.88) = \$6,853
 - It should be noted that NRC Levy was previously expected to Increase by 2.5% annually, and was \$7.69 per head for 2021
 - VRC is currently non-financial with the NRC, with the final instalment for 2022 unpaid. This is presently subject to some discussion and escalation may result in VRC having to accept this charge. It has been provided for in the 2022 P&L.
 - NRC Moot Buddies Levy remains \$1 per Rover at \$1,165.
 - NRC Meeting costs have been increased to cover potential interstate travel costs for VRC delegations.
- Equipment Maintenance and Minor purchases Includes an allocation of \$1000 for each. This Is largely to fund any required maintenance, insurance and minor items for the Victorian Rover Centre, and our three trailer assets.
- Yearbook, based on quotes for the 2022 year book an amount of \$1300 has been accrued in the 2022 year offset by lower then expected spend on the previous yearbooks. For 2023, an allowance of \$1,750 is made, which remains a considerable saving on previous years.
- An intent with setting up the Rover levy is to fund a Victorian Moot buddy program, an an allowance of \$1 per Rover and RA has been included in the budget for this purpose. This is distinct from the NRC Moot Buddy levy.
- Other items of expenditure remain consistent with prior years, and have been considered and confirmed with the office bearer group.

ACTION REQUESTED

It is recommended that the Victorian Rover Council note the contents of this cover letter and the attached budget and approves the 2022-23 VRC operating budget.

Tractor Proposal

Version 1.1 - August 2022

Preamble

The following proposal has been pulled together by a working group of the Mafeking Rover Park Management Group in consultation with the Rover Scout Motorsport Committee, and is based on the best advice available at the time of submission to the Victorian Rover Council.

Background

Mafeking Rover Park

Mafeking Rover Park, known by many in Rovering as 'The Park', is a 320 acre campsite located in the Central Highlands of Victoria. Owned by Scouts Victoria and operated by the Mafeking Rover Park Management Group (MRPMG) on behalf of the Rover Scout Section, the Park provides an exclusive opportunity for Rovers to have ownership over a space that meets Rovering's unique Scouting Program demands. Considered to be the spiritual home of Rovering in Victoria, Mafeking Rover Park provides opportunities for all Rover Scouts to try new things, meet new people, develop important leadership, teamwork, and business management skills through Scouting's *Learning by Doing* mantra.

Mafeking is the home of Rover Scout Motorsport (RSM), hosting the majority of the championship events including RSM's premiere event each year - Mudbash. The site includes a dedicated section of race tracks and is the only Scouts Victoria campsite able to host motorsport events.

The Tractor

Mafeking Rover Park currently owns one tractor, which is used for vital maintenance and upkeep tasks at the Park. A basic list of tasks include but are not limited to:

- Slashing of grassed areas
- Maintenance and repair of roads and race tracks
- Fencing and post-hole digging
- Shifting heavy items such as fallen trees
- Leaf-litter and drain clearing

These tasks are vital to maintain a functioning campsite that is able to be used by Rover hirers, Scouting hirers, and external hirers. Some of these tasks are a critically important part of the Park's bushfire risk management plan to ensure the safety and security of the asset.

Mafeking Rover Park is owned by Victorian Rover Scouts and operated on their behalf by the Mafeking Committee of Management. For more information about Scouting in Victoria check out www.scoutsvictoria.com.au ALL VICTORIANS ENJOYING SCOUTING The tractor is a Massey-Ferguson 188, colloquially referred to as 'Big Red'. This model of tractor was manufactured between 1792-1976, meaning the tractor is at least 46 and potentially up to 50 years old. The tractor has an aftermarket roll-bar installed, but in many ways does not meet the current safety standards overall for operation in 2022. The age of the tractor also means that sourcing replacement parts when needed is becoming increasingly difficult and expensive.

The tractor was purchased by the Park in 2006-2007 for \$15,000 with funds loaned from the Victorian Branch Rover Council to the Mafeking Rover Park Management Group. The loan was repaid on time over a 10 year period.

Current State

'Big Red' is currently non-operational due to an issue with the hydraulic pump which runs the 3 point linkage. This means that while the tractor will drive, none of the attachments for the tractor, including the slashing deck used to cut grass, are able to be used.

At the June working bee the tractor was assessed by 2 current Rovers with experience working on agricultural equipment including tractors of this type. A full report of their findings is included with this document as Appendix 1.

Due to the age of the tractor, sourcing a new hydraulic pump suitable for the machine is challenging and expensive and may require parts shipped internationally. Reconditioning the current pump is estimated to cost approximately \$4000. In addition, the labour costs associated with this work are significant and at this stage we have not been able to identify a volunteer with the necessary skills required to undertake the work.

Proposal - A New Tractor

Considering the significant costs of repairs required to get the current tractor back online, the age of the machine, and the large ongoing maintenance costs, the Mafeking Rover Park Management Group supported by Rover Scout Motorsport, are proposing to invest in a new tractor for Mafeking.

This investment will ensure the ongoing operation of the site with minimal interruptions using safe, modern equipment. This investment will also support the operations and capabilities of the Park for the next 10-15 years.

Recommended Specifications

MRPMG along with the RSM Committee have pulled together the following requirements for a new machine. These are the desired specifications of any new machine to ensure maximum value and safety for all operators.

- Modern safety features including rollover protective structures (ROPS), enclosed cab and seat belt
- 4WD for managing terrain and conditions at Mafeking
- Power Take-Off (PTO) arm, allowing power from the tractor's drive shaft to power tractor attachments including a slasher deck
- Slasher deck, used for slashing (mowing) grass and small brush
- Tow point
- Front end loader capabilities
- Hydraulic remote connections
- CAT 2 linkage to utilise existing attachments owned by MRP
- 360 degree working light for safe night time operation
- Automatic battery guard system to maintain battery life. Due to patterns of use (primarily on weekends and at working bees)

Costings

MRPMG has reached out to a number of vendors looking for appropriate tractors to meet these specifications for the Park. We explored purchasing both new and second hand tractors, as well as a leasing arrangement. A breakdown of these is included below. The full set of quotes are included in this document as Appendix 2.

Please note, these quotes are not necessarily the machines that Mafeking will end up purchasing, but are presented as examples of the options currently available on the market. Once the funding is approved the working group would undertake a process of assessing all of these options and identifying the one that both meets the requirements determined by the committee and ensures the best use of funds.

New Tractors

Kubota M7040DHC 68HP Cab Tractor - \$77,990 Bertolis Agricultural & Industrial Quote 3792

John Deere 5075E Cab and Titan 7300 Loader - \$75,322.56 Hutcheon & Pearce Quote 566179

Second Hand Tractors

<u>1992 Massey Ferguson Tractor</u> available on Gum Tree - \$24,500 Includes enclosed cab, 4x4, 3 point linkage and front end Would require the purchase of some additional accessories including a slasher deck

<u>2002 Massey Ferguson Tractor</u> available on Facebook Marketplace - \$40,000 Includes enclosed cab, 4x4, 3 point linkage and front end

Recommendation

As seen in the examples above the purchase of a brand new machine would cost significantly more with only few specification differences to the second hand models available for purchase at significantly less cost.

It is our recommendation that we purchase a high quality second hand machine which meets the specifications list above at the cost of up to \$40,000.

Lease Arrangement

The committee would be open to explore lease arrangements if this is something the VRC has a strong preference for. While these programs have some advantages, it is felt that having one reliable machine that operators are able to be familiar with and we own outright is the best setup for Mafeking and Victorian Rovers. It is worth noting that Lease Arrangements may result in broken contracts if there are issues with the machine that were caused by incidents occurring on site during routine use of the tractor, and that this may be a bigger financial burden than managing the outright ownership of a tractor.

Alternative Models - Hiring Equipment

A tractor or equivalent machinery is vital to the operation of Mafeking Rover Park. If Mafeking does not have a safe and functional tractor the committee will need to hire in machinery and in some cases contractors to perform the tasks normally completed by volunteers using the Park's equipment. The total cost of the basic maintenance activities required to keep the Park operational is estimated at approximately \$22,000 per annum. A breakdown of how this was calculated is included below.

- Cost of slashing 3 times a year
- Cost of machinery hire after each race event
- Pre-fire season maintenance costs

Slashing

This cost is based on a contractor coming to the Park to slash the 170 acres of grassed area. This work is currently undertaken approximately 3 times a year depending on the weather and growth rate of the grass.

These costs are based on an old quote sourced by a previous MRPMG committee. We have reached out to local contractors to find a more up to date cost however they did not respond in time for the submission of this proposal. These quotes can be shared with VRC when they are available.

Track Maintenance

This cost is based on the weekend hire of a small skid steer machine hired (BobCat) for 3 days (Friday-Sunday) at the conclusion of each race event hosted at the Park. Larger machines would incur additional costs. Does not include running costs of fuel etc.

Fire Danger Period Preparation

This cost is based on the hire of a large skid steer machine hired for 3 days (Friday-Sunday) for 2 working bees ahead of the fire danger period. This work required a machine powerful enough to complete the brush clearing and other works needed in preparation for fire season and is therefore more expensive per-hire than the track maintenance works.

Other Tractor Jobs

These costs do not take into account any other work done using the tractor at working bees, such as post-hole digging and fence repair, shifting of large heavy objects such as fallen trees, and many other ad hoc tasks. It also does not include any capital works projects that would also become more expensive as they hired in equipment, such as the clearing and leveling of areas in preparation for the installation of additional enviro-toilet blocks.

Summary

These costs are significant and would continue to be incurred annually to ensure the upkeep of the campsite, only growing over time as machinery hire and contractors become more expensive. In contrast, the purchase of the new tractor, while requiring a large initial outlay of funds, would save money over the first 3 years of the machine even considering the associated maintenance and running costs.

While these costs would be lower than purchasing a new machine in the first 2 years, these expenses would occur annually and increase over time as machinery hire and contractors become more expensive. In contrast the purchase of a new tractor, while requiring a large initial outlay of funds, would save money in the long run even taking into consideration the ongoing maintenance costs associated with a machine of this type. In addition, the flexibility of having a machine onsite at all times to respond immediately to unforeseen events ensures the smooth continued operation of the site without interruption to hirers and the challenge of locating, hiring, and transporting appropriate equipment when the need arises.

Proposed Funding Breakdown

The Mafeking Rover Park Management Group is seeking funding from the Victorian Rover Council for this project of up to \$40,000. It is proposed that this costs is divided as follows:

- \$10,000 from Mafeking Rover Park
- \$10,000 from Rover Scout Motorsport
- \$20,000 from Victorian Rover Council

The MRPMG intends to spend \$10,000 of their funds towards the project. As per the July meeting of the Rover Scout Motorsport Committee, RSM have approved \$10,000 of funding to contribute to this project. MRPMG and RSM are asking VRC to match the investment from these two sub-committees.

MRPMG and RSM would welcome the investment of funds from the Rover Section to Mafeking Rover Park as one of the Section's key assets and the home of motorsport for Scouting. Following two years of disruption to both bookings and maintenance efforts due to the Pandemic and associated lockdowns, an injection of funds is much needed to help restore the Park to a fully operational asset.

MRPMG understands that this is a large investment and would be open to the idea of an interest-free loan of VRC funds, to be paid back over a period of 5 years (\$20,000 over 5 years at an annual payment of \$4000). This money will be in addition to the \$1,000- VRC appropriations paid to the VRC to support the Park's capabilities for delivering for the Program needs of Rovering and the wider Scouting Community.

Upkeep and Training

To ensure the safe operation of the new machine, MRPMG is proposing that all tractor drivers complete a nationally recognised unit of competency (RIIMPO315E - Conduct Tractor Operations) before they are able to drive the tractor. Recognition of prior experience may be granted to Rovers with significant experience with similar machinery, at the discretion of the MRPMG Executive.

After the purchase of the new machine a group of approx 6 operators, including at least one member of the RSM committee, would complete training funded by MRPMG. Due to savings on training a large group at once the initial cost for this training is approximately \$2000. Subsequently, Mafeking intends to budget for 2 new operators to be trained each financial year to ensure the committee always has sufficiently qualified operators. The cost of this training is approximately \$500 per operator.

Appendix 1

On Saturday 25th June we were asked to look at Mafeking's Massey Ferguson tractor after some issues were identified with the machine at Mudbash. An issue was identified with the hydraulic pump which drives the tractor's 3 point linkage requiring the pump to either be replaced or reconditioned.

Based on our experience this work would require significant investment of both time and money and considering the age and condition of the machine it is our recommendation that the committee looks to invest in a new tractor for the Park.

Rover-Presented Scout AT&D Training in Victoria

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to provide a reference on the activities of the Subcommittee variously known as the Victorian Rover Training Team, Rover Training Support Team, and Rover Training Victoria; as well as its influence on Victorian Rovers, Rover Training nationally, and Scouts Victoria AT&D in the period 2006 - 2021.

Background

Rover Training in Victoria can be traced to the Rover Mate's course, first run by Bill Waters in 1939, which continued in different forms until Rovers gained access to the Woodbadge training program in 1994. After Rovers joined RAs in the AT&D training pipeline, what was now known as the Crew Leader's Course became the Techniques and Skills Course (TASC) and then later still, the VicRovers Induction.

The Rover Training Team similarly dates back to the interwar period. Bill was assisted by a team of Rover Leaders to deliver his training course, and Rover Training remained the domain of RLs, RAs, and members of the National Training Team until 2006.

As of 2021, all Leaders now complete the same training program regardless of the Section they operate in. Sectional training is intended to be delivered solely through the On the Job Milestones (replacing Tech Skills and Inservice components of the previous system,) which means that the Rover section no longer has direct input into the training that its leaders are required to complete.

Discussion Points

In the beginning

At the beginning of Rover involvement in Rover Training, training courses were organised by the Assistant Region Commissioners for Training. The training pathway was a simple one.

- 1. Intro to Scouting Seminar (2.5 hours, generally on a weeknight at a district hall)
- 2. Technical Skills (on the job learning)
- 3. In-Service (on the job learning)
- 4. Rover Basic (2 full weekends at a region scout centre or campsite)
- 5. Rover Advanced (3 full weekends at a campsite, possibly 2)
- 6. District Woodbadge Evaluation

Someone moving between sections would return to step 3 and complete the appropriate courses for the new section.

The first innovation was the Intro to Rovers Seminar, which replaced the Intro to Scouting seminar. As most Rovers are long-time members of the Movement, we were able to get the generic scouting content out of the way quickly and then induct new members into the unique parts of Rovers such as our unique governance structures, property portfolio, and major events.

Another advantage to the Intro seminar was the ability to develop new training team members. As an introductory course, we were able to use basic trained Rovers, such as Region Execs, as Subject Matter Experts under the supervision of Woodbadged Rovers who had completed Train the Trainer courses. With lower stakes than a basic course, it was easier to try out potential team members.

Common Core

The first evolution in training delivery during this time was the introduction of Basic and Advanced Common Core. The training pathway now looked like this:

- 1. Intro to Rovers Seminar (3 hours)
- 2. Technical Skills (on the job learning)
- 3. In-Service (on the job learning)
- 4. Basic Common Core (1 weekend)
- 5. Rover basic Sectional Techniques (1 weekend)
- 6. Advanced Common Core (1 weekend)
- 7. Rover Advanced (2 weekends?)
- 8. District Woodbadge Evaluation

During this time, we experimented with delivering sectional courses on a weeknight over a number of weeks, and began to market our courses by location rather than by organising region (for example, Rover Basic @ the Warburton Chalet instead of RYVER Region Rover Basic.)

Unlike the other sections, where a leader is required to attend Basic training within 12 months and Advanced within 3 years, training has always been optional for Victorian Rovers. This meant that much of our team's effort was taken up by convincing Rovers to sign up for courses. Once we removed specific Regions from the course names - a common sense move following the 2010 Region realignment (we gained two new metropolitan regions,) we began to see more Rovers willing to travel across Region boundaries to attend courses and soon "networking opportunities" were added to the promotional materials.

eLearning

In 2011, Scouts Australia launched the first eLearning modules. Interestingly, and contrary to our expectations, the introduction of eLearning initially saw a surge of Rovers completing the Intro to Rovers Seminar - particularly at Mudbash and Surfmoot where we ran them on Saturday afternoon. But as interest waned as the eLearning pathway became more accepted and they were finally removed from the training calendar when Common Core went fully online.

The Rover Section was approached by Joan Bradd (BC Training) and invited to redevelop the Rover Basic course to demonstrate the advantages of the online platform. So we looked at the eLearning modules, compared them to the national curriculum, and struck out everything that was already covered in the modules. Then we filled the time back up with practical activities to embed the learnings, and introduced new sessions like Crew Finances, Meeting Chairmanship, and Mentoring - things to help Rover Scouts to run great Rover Crews, and great programs.

This proposal came at a convenient time, as a sizable group of Rovers had first been elected to Region and Subcommittee roles and came together at the first VicRovers Induction. These Rovers first requested a second weekend of the Induction course, and then followed up with asking for us to put on a special basic course. So these 20 Rovers volunteered to be our guinea pigs at Pax Hill. They loved it and passionately promoted the Basic Course to their friends - and since all their friends were going to be there, we were then able to recruit these highly capable individuals to present sessions.

This excitement about the Basic course also leaked to the Advanced course. That year, for the first time, the combined Rover/Leader of Adult Advanced course at Treetops had more Rovers than Leaders. But as we ran through the course, it became obvious that we could not allow our Basic guinea pigs, who were already beginning to make noises about all signing up for the next Advanced course, to experience the Advanced course as it stood.

So we did the only thing we could do: book out a scout hall, get out the butcher's paper, and redesign that course as well. This meant that we were decoupling our advanced course from the LoA, which at the time felt like a bit of a gamble. While we were confident that we were seeing sustainable growth in Basic course participants, we had no way to know if Rovers would want to continue on to Advanced. Our feedback was overwhelmingly positive, but in those days, there was a significant hurdle in the shape of the SAIT Certificate IV workbooks that were still a required part of completing Advanced courses and the Woodbadge.

One challenge at this time was managing the different training pathways. We had participants who had already completed Common Core, or old-style section training in other sections, but this was easily solved by getting them to complete the Rover eLearning modules.

May Madness

It started from quite humble beginnings - Lachlan Preston fronted up with 10 completed training application forms and a calendar, trying to lock in a date for our first eLearning Advanced Course that would work for everyone. Since we had field tested our Basic course in Ballarat, it was agreed that the Advanced would run in Melbourne - and since we were doing training, we thought why not do it at Gilwell? As we looked at our own availability, we saw capacity to do Basic at the same time, so we added that on and got the participants to do that promo that they were so good at. Even VRC got on board, attempting to hold the Rover Advisor's Seminar in the same location - although attendance was quite poor and this feature was not repeated.

In 2013, May Madness was thrown together as an on-demand course. In 2014, it became our signature event. Would I have flippantly named the Facebook Events that had I known that more than 300 people would attend over the course of seven years? Without a second's hesitation.

2014 also saw a contingent of trainers from NSW come to observe and present on the courses, and over seven years of running the course, we had representation from Tasmania, ACT, and WA as either a presenter or participant. One Victorian participant later moved to the Northern Territory taking a leading role in NT Rovers, and then was appointed Branch Commissioner Youth Program.

The success of May Madness saw us attempt the same structure at the end of the year, but it never achieved the same success. Rovember always seemed to struggle, perhaps impacted by a longer end of year exam period, and while we were generally able to get the numbers together for a Basic Course, Advanced only ran a few times. The Rovember courses were initially held at Pax Hill, but switched to Gilwell around 2016, due to a lack of numbers from the western side of the state.

Continuous Improvement

The emphasis on continuous improvement came about almost by accident. When we first plotted out the program for the experimental eLearning Basic at Ballarat, we figured that since no one had ever tried anything like it, we should first validate that all the learning outcomes were being met and second that we should ourselves ask the participants if they were enjoying the course, and whether there was anything that they had expected to cover that we hadn't.

On that first course, we had two review sessions - one at the end of both days. There were several opportunities that were identified in Saturday's session that we were able to insert into Sunday (with some minor adjustments to the timetable.) These adjustments were made

permanent, and the same approach continued to be followed until our final AT&D courses at May Madness 2021.

May Madness actually brought us an evolution in the review session. Since we were running two courses, we thought that we might get more honest feedback if we could get the other Course Leader to conduct the review. I don't know if we uncovered anything that wouldn't have come out anyway, but the participants seemed more comfortable, and we certainly had a lot of fun over the years ejecting each other when the time came.

Validating the content required a different approach though. While we were confident that Basic was hitting all the right notes, we paid greater attention to Advanced. An experienced member of the team (originally Sarah Austin, later Brad Peters) sat in on the course with a copy of the curriculum specifically to ensure that all the required points were being covered in every session.

It is possible that these measures may have fallen by the wayside, but with three major revisions to the course or curriculum between 2012 and 2021, there was always something that we wanted to check on.

Policy

It was for many years VRC policy that all Crew Leaders were expected to complete Basic Training in Rovers, but by mid-2013, we had had enough Rovers (in general, and around the VRC table specifically) through Basic Training that we were able to roll out training requirements for other key leaders in the section, the VRC Officebearers Group, Region Chairs, and Subcommittee Chairs.

Each of these categories were required to complete Rover Basic, while the VRC Chairmans Team and Training Officer needed to go further and complete the Rover Advanced course. There was some slight alteration around the edges of this policy over the years, but it remained largely intact until after the final May Madness courses in 2021.

2017 National Curriculum

One thing that the eLearning project revealed to the National Training Committee was the massive variation between branches that had developed in training curricula across the country since the last version of the national curriculum was published in the mid-1990s. Over the next 20 years, all branches had changed the way that they were presenting the Basic and Advanced courses as they experimented to provide better options for their Leaders.

They felt that this had to change, and efforts were made across the country to realign to the published curriculum. At a meeting of the National Rover Council, the immortal phrase "we may all be wrong, but at least we're all wrong together" was uttered, and a national review of the Rover curriculum was launched with funding from the Rover Development Fund.

The overall project was led by John Hooper from SA, but there were two representatives from each state. Our experiences with repeated course development over the preceding five years and the proven results of our training program, meant that the Victorian representatives were in a strong position to drive the conversations and secured a finished product that was strongly reminiscent of the Victorian curriculum that had just been retired - although there were of course new ideas integrated from other Branches based on their smaller and less-corporate needs.

A Team Approach

One of the biggest strengths of Rover Training compared to other sections has been our team approach. Even before responsibility for training was taken away from the Regions, we worked at a State level, using the same tools and presenters across Victoria instead of insular Region-based teams. Prior to 2012, this team was largely recruited on our behalf by the Regions, most of whom elected a specific training officer as a member of the Region Executive - and these members would generally stay for a 12 month term before moving on, much as with other positions across the Vicrovers management structure.

However the situation changed in the 2010/11 term. Scouts Victoria had realigned the Regions across metropolitan Melbourne to match the city's growth corridors, and some months later, the Rover section followed - complete with a new structure for the Regions teams. The non-executive members were no longer elected with specific responsibilities, but instead into a generic Development Officer role that would take on different tasks across the year as required.

From 2012, our recruitment strategy changed - instead of demanding attendance from representatives of the different Regions, we instead began to invite high quality Rovers who we identified as having an aptitude for different roles we required either delivering training on a course, or getting Rovers to attend those courses. Our team became much stronger because of this, and we were able to extend the reach of training to all areas of the state - courses were run from Gippsland to our cores in Melbourne and Ballarat to Shepparton and even Mildura.

Scouts Victoria AT&D used to run an annual conference for all Personal Leader Advisors in the state, and initially, there was one Rover attending the conference. Noticing the strong interest that many other leaders had in talking about the Rover section, the team began to attend in austentatious red hats in an effort to further raise awareness of Rovers completing the AT&D training program.

Conclusion

It is pleasing to see the successful change that has been driven by our team over the past fifteen years, both internally, and through the wider Rover and AT&D communities that we feed into.

Equally pleasing are our results. Hundreds of young adults (and quite a few older adults as well) have benefited from the training courses that we have delivered, and have gone on to use the skills and knowledge they acquired to deliver quality Scouting to Rovers in Crews, as well as in their personal and professional lives outside of Scouting.

The greatest measure of our success to me remains the confused responses from young Rovers to the training questions posed when preparing the 2014-2016 Vicrovers Strategic Plan. Only two years after the introduction of the eLearning basic, we had already achieved such a change in the way that the section was being run that young people couldn't imagine a world where our OBs Group and the Region & Subcommittee Chairs would not complete Rover training as a part of their role.

The challenge now for our team is to remain relevant in a world where AT&D courses are delivered once in a person's career as a Leader.

KEY POINTS

- For the peak award, a Leadership or Personal Development Course Is needed to be earned, which has specific requirements. Currently, If a Rover wanted to do this within the movement, they could complete their Youth Program training (comprising of a Scouting Essentials course, Scouting Adventure, and subsequent On the Job Milestones). This Is not section specific.
- The Rover Training Support Team aim to develop a Unit Management Course specifically for Rovers, which teaches specific knowledge and skills.
- We are calling this a Unit Management Course as to not cause language confusion between this, and current 'Scouting Leadership' courses.
- This will not take away the team focus or ability to conduct 'Scouting Essentials' course, and Scouting Leadership' courses.

BACKGROUND

 There has always been value In Rovers teaching Rovers. The team have also noted a brief history of Rover training for discussion. Since the transition of training pathways, from section specific training, to non-section specific training, a gap has been created In some of the training needs for Rovers.

ACTION REQUESTED

It is recommended that the Victorian Rover Council:

• Endorse the Rover Training Support Team develop and implement a Unit Management course that satisfies the requirements of Peak Award requirement of doing a Leadership Course.
