5 Sub-Committee Reporting

5.1 Mafeking Rover Park

Mafeking has had a busy month this month getting ready for VG in a week and a half. With the tractor still being down alot of work has gone into mowing the park, a huge thank you to Kev from the police scouters who has put in a huge effort especially around the golf course to get it ready for Mafeking Masters. We ran Mafeking Masters at the November working bee last weekend and had about 10 people participate so that was good. Thanks to Craigieburn and Dadpa for providing food to those that attended the working bee.

Looking forward we have a few events coming up including our Mafeking Christmas Party at the Red Eye Bar in St Kilda on the 22nd of December and Tube and Tunes at the February Working Bee from the 16th to the 18th of Feb. We also have New Years at Mafeking starting on 29th of December running to 1st of Jan. You must be a registered scout to attend and over 18yrs old, \$5 per head per night. We will also be running our December committee meeting on 18th of December, all are welcome to come along tonight.



We are very excited to announce that Mafeking has been chosen to host an International LARP event over Cup Weekend. The event will have between 400 to 600 people on site and will go for 4 days. This event is estimated to bring in between \$9000 to \$11000. This is huge for the park and will be really great exposure as well as really wonderful income.

Regarding tractor repair: the Mafeking tractor engine is not in good shape at the moment. We had Phil, our resident diesel mechanic, look at it and he has suggested the best option is to get the engine rebuilt by a professional as there is a lot more that needs to go into it and he doesn't have the time to. As a result the tractor engine has come back to Melbourne and we have been looking around for quotes. The best option is to go through HM Gem Machining Services. The quote is estimated between \$7000 to \$8000. Mafeking is not in the financial position to be able to afford this at the moment for RSM have very kindly agreed to pay for these repairs. We would like approval to go ahead and spend these funds.

5.2 Surfmoot Kira Miles

Two months to go until Surfmoot! Things seem to be on track so far, with the departments focusing on finalising things before December.

Our activities program has been finalised and we will have this released to punters this week.

We released service tickets last week, which received a lot of positive feedback. Within 24hrs of posting we already had 3 people send in an expression of interest, some of which were from interestate.

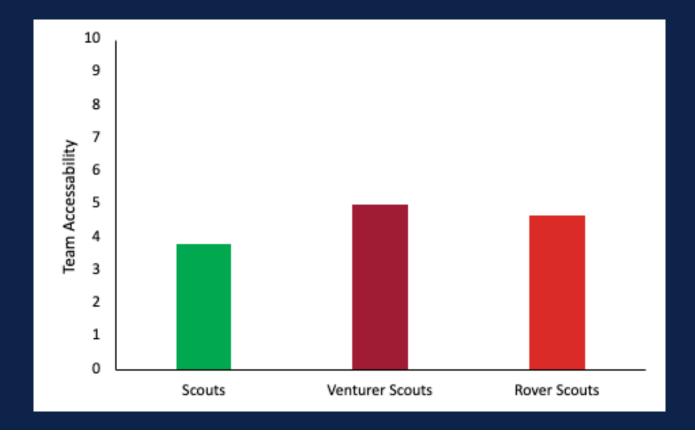

AMENDMENTS

Gate duty:

The gate duty roster, as previously outlined, ended in 2022. A new roster has been created with the following criteria:

- Each region must have equal allocations
- The region rostered for Rover Dinner is not allocated Gate Duty for during the same year
- Regions must be balanced based on event attendance.

Previously this has been a 10-year plan. The new proposal is a 24/25 year plan and follows each of the 3 criteria.

For simplicity and equality, we have grouped the regions into 3. These groups have been created using the statistics of Mudbash and Surfmoot attendance over the last 5 years. Each group makes up exactly 1/3 of the attendees as shown by the numbers next to each region name. These groups are:

- Group 1: Plenty Valley (17%), Melbourne (14%) and Murray Midlands (2%) [event percentage: 33%]
- Group 2: Lerderderg (15%), Bays (18%) [event percentage: 33%]
- Group 3: Mt Dandenong (21%), Gippsland (7%), South West (6%) [event percentage: 34%]

As you will see as you read through it, even with the limitations, there are no regions doing back-to-back duty years. There are occasions where (due to the Rover Dinner cycle) a region group has been moved to later in the roster, however all regions have exactly 8 duties over the course of the cycle.

The roster will need to be reviewed every 5–10 years to ensure that it is running smoothly.

KEY POINTS

• The topic of dietaries and events has been spoken about informally for many years:

BACKGROUND

- Whilst most dietary requirements or food intolerances can be accommodated, occasionally there are some that are too complicated to work into an events menu.
- Members have been required to self-cater at their own expense whilst still being required to pay full price for an event ticket.
- At times where the committee has decided to discount the tickets due to catering, there has been no formal process to follow.
- Some members have indicated that they do not attend events due concerns around their dietary requirements.
- Self-catering is always a last resort, it is the expectation that the catering team try and accommodate as many dietary requirements as possible.

ACTION REQUESTED

It is recommended that the Victorian Rover Council:

- Require that any member who has been advised by the events caterers (or committee members) to self-cater, have the catering portion of their event ticket refunded.
- Events look into the idea of creating a non-catered ticket for events, either publicly available or through contact with the Event Organizers.
 - o When tickets are released, the member purchases a ticket
 - After ticket is purchased, the member contacts the committee or catering team of the event to enquire about their dietary requirements.
 - Catering Team advise the member and the events committee if they can cater for the requirement or if the member is to self-cater.

MULTI PURPOSE ACTIVITY CENTRE (MPAC)

BRIEFING PAPER FOR VICTORIAN ROVER COUNCIL

Introduction

It is now some years since the concept of a Multi Purpose Activity Centre (MPAC) was proposed for construction at Mafeking. Some newer members of the Victorian Rover Council (VRC) may have wondered at the inclusion of this item on the agenda for the monthly VRC meetings. This paper provides an outline for VRC members of the original concept, the rationale for its creation and the processes followed to design, building and planning approval, funding arrangements and a host of other relevant information.

Background

The concept of a Multi Purpose Activity Centre has been the subject of discussion by the VRC over many years. The Northern Region Training Building was originally envisaged to satisfy the need, but it was never developed, and over the years, fell into disrepair. The building was demolished and has been replaced with a 'picnic shelter' and a toilet and shower block providing much needed additional facilities to cope with periods of high demand (Mudbash etc) and, over time, enable savings from the current cost of hire of additional facilities for those major events.

A Planning Permit was received from the Shire of Murrindindi. After substantial design work, an application for a Building Permit was lodged with the Shire, which was subsequently issued by the Shire following us meeting CFA requirements and gaining a permit to install a septic system.

In early discussions, the BEC endorsed our proposals to construct MPAC and there was support from the then State Leadership Team (SLT).

At the time, the BEC was prepared to contribute to funding the construction of MPAC, but on a 'loan basis' only – there was no grant. This loan of \$400,000 was to be repaid over a period of 20 years. Other funds to cover the anticipated \$600,000 construction costs would come from existing Rover resources and has been the subject of endorsement by previous VRCs.

Since the original concept was endorsed there has been a number of delays in getting the project "off the ground". The funding estimates at the time for the envisaged Centre have now increased significantly to the extent that it is unlikely that the project would be funded. However, it may be possible with some radical design changes, and the use of pre-fabricated construction, that a Centre could be constructed close to original estimates. These options will need to be examined in more detail.

The attached paper provides a history of the MPAC concept, its proposed use and location at Mafeking.

- The Centre will be suitable for use by all Sections, school groups and external hirers, as well
 as for training and large meetings, in addition to use as an Adventure Centre.

Benefits

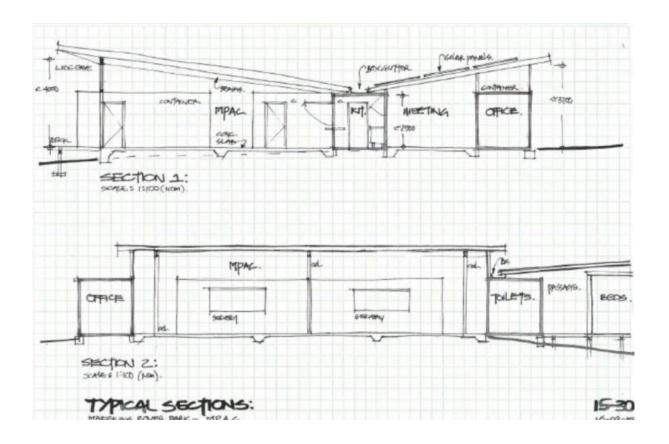
- Mafeking Rover Park is able to offer a unique activity program that no-one else in Scouting is able to deliver. Increased adventurous activities/ program for Scouting youth members in Victoria
- Provides Mafeking the activities and infrastructure needed for the next development of Mafeking Rover Park. Investment in a campsite that is financially stable, well-utilised and has a unique purpose.
- Additional opportunities for Rovers to expand their skills and knowledge (running Mafeking is youth program) through the construction project, campsite management and ongoing coordination of the Adventure Centre.
- The location of Mafeking is well suited for access from northern new growth suburbs

Proposal Overview

The Mafeking Adventure Centre will incorporate the construction of a centre from which adventure based programs will be delivered for Scouts of all ages, based around the themes of racing and speed.

Originally, it was envisaged that the proposed Centre would comprise a main conference/training/meeting/dining space of approximately 130 sq. metres surrounded by a variety of separate facilities which would contain a commercial kitchen capable of producing meals for up to 100 personnel, training "break-out" rooms, storage capacity for equipment associated with the delivery of the proposed adventurous activities, toilet facilities (including disabled facilities) and office space to house course management staff.

Additionally, there would be accommodation for 36 people in motel style construction designed to house 6 people with self-contained bathroom facilities for each accommodation module. There will be a separate unit specially equipped to satisfy the needs for disabled patrons. The rooms will be designed in such a manner that they can be easily configured to accommodate only one person to meet the likely requirements for prospective corporate clients.



Ongoing Management

It was proposed that the facility would be managed by the Mafeking Rover Park Committee, who currently maintain the bookings and all maintenance for facilities at Mafeking Rover Park.

It was envisaged that a specific team would be established to run the delivery of the program. This team would either report through the Mafeking Committee or directly to the Victorian Rover Council and this will be determined at the time of establishment and may change over time.

The Mafeking Rover Park Committee reports to the Victorian Rover Council, and the committee is elected annually by Victorian Rovers. The annual budget and financial report is approved by the VRC.

Project Risks

Some risks associated with this project were identified early in the process. These included the following:

- Council approval for the project would be delayed
- Construction delays
- > Building could have lower risks than anticipated
- Fire danger at the property

These are discussed in more detail later in the document.

OHS Arrangements

The buildings as designed were to be constructed to comply with all current building regulations and have been designed to meet all construction requirements needed to be registered as an accredited campsite.

All staff assisting to deliver activities from the Adventure Centre will be required to undertake Scoutsafe, Childsafe and WHS & Scouting training, as requirements of being adults on Scouting, as this applies to Rovers as well as adult leaders.

All activities will be developed with risk management procedures and risk assessments which will be a key part of the operating procedures for the Adventure Centre Team.

Consultation

Mafeking Rover Park

Has been a key stakeholder, was a key player in discussions and had been pushing for almost a decade to have a pack holiday centre style accommodation developed.

Victorian Rover Council

Significant player in this project and was reported to regularly. Approved the plan to proceed with the project and approved funding to cover architecture and site planning costs.

Victorian Rovers

The plan to develop (including partially funding) a multi-purpose activity centre was taken to all Rover Region Communities for discussion before being voted upon and approved by the Victorian Rover Council.

State Leadership Team

There had been regular contact with the SLT which led to refinements in the project plan including the development of the facility as an Activity Centre. A presentation on this final plan was presented to the whole SLT and was endorsed to proceed to the BEC.

Murrindindi Shire Council

We have been in close contact with the Shire Council prior to receiving a planning permit and a building permit.

Attachment 1. Adventure Centre Plans.

The Mafeking Adventure Centre was to be based on the themes of speed and motion and will build on Mafeking's branding as the home of racing.

Groups coming to the Adventure Centre will choose from a range of stand-alone activities and programs, build around the concepts of speed, motion, mechanics and engines. These will be developed around the Areas of Personal Growth and will utilise the Scout Method, ensuring the Scouting Education methods are used.

Attachment 2: Detailed Project Financials

Budget

Based on costings developed in consultation with our architect, it was estimated originally that this project would cost \$600,000. This included development of confirmed plans, obtaining relevant permits, and construction (including professional labour) and the development of the Activity Centre including purchase of necessary equipment and activities. Also included in the costings of this project were funds to cover the installation of a septic system and the connection of the facility to the existing power infrastructure at the Park and a 10% contingency.

Based on concerns around resource limitations of Scouts, significant effort has gone into looking at cost-effective production methods and building design, which, hopefully, will reduce the estimated costs to close to the original estimates.

Key Points

At the time, based on the calculations, it was believed that the Adventure Centre would break even on investment after 20 years of operation. These estimates were made only based on weekend booking fees and did not take into account the potential for future bookings during the week, which would hasten the rate of return on the investment. This could not be factored in at that stage, as Mafeking would need to develop future plans to build this capacity.

The Adventure Centre was budgeted to run on a \$10 profit per individual over a weekend, after costs are removed. This was considered to be the easiest way to budget for this, as different activities will have different prices, depending on what equipment and resources are being used.

It was anticipated that the property would cost \$5,000 per year in yearly operational costs, which have been calculated to increase by 3% each year. On top of this, an expense of \$5,000 every five years was factored in for capital maintenance.

These costs will be covered by the income from the hire of the building and funds will be set aside throughout the five year period, to ensure that the capital maintenance funds are available when needed.

The Multi-Purpose Activity Centre is a project that has been mooted multiple times. A building was moved from Seymour to Mafeking for the purpose of being turned into a training centre around 15 years ago, but funding was not supplied to finalise the project and the building, having been damaged beyond repair, has now been demolished and replaced with a picnic shelter and toilets and showers.

Funding Rationale & Precedents

The purchase of Mafeking Rover Park was conducted with the support of Scouts Victoria. The 30 years since this purchase has been an extraordinary display of the capabilities of the Rover Section and vindicated the decision of the Rovers and Scouting leadership of the time to invest in Mafeking. The Rover Section borrowed money from Scouts Victoria, which was utilised to purchase Mafeking Rover Park and this funding was repaid in less than the originally envisaged time period, thus demonstrating that the section can handle a "loan" of substantial proportions.

Mafeking Rover Park also has limited cash reserves, particularly given it committed to significant development before The Moot in 2016-2017. This significant development was funded by Rovers (including profits from events such as Mudbash) and is significantly more investment than any other section contributes to Scouts Victoria properties.

Victorian Rover Council Funding

The Victorian Rover Council (VRC) is committed to the development of Mafeking Rover Park. In consultation with Rovers for the selection process for sites for The Moot, a key reason for selecting Mafeking was to continue the great development at Mafeking that occurred, particularly in the lead-up to Yea Moot in 1999.

Furthermore, the Rover Section has consulted with the Regions and the aims of this proposal were voted on by the VRC. It was agreed that we were to engage with Scouts Victoria and for the Rover section to contribute and/or commit to borrowing significant funding for the construction of these facilities.

The Branch Executive Council previously endorsed the project and confirmed that it would loan the Rover Section \$400,000 which was to be repaid over 20 years, in similar fashion to the arrangement for the purchase of Mafeking. This arrangement will need to be re-negotiated with the BEC.

Attachment 3: Detailed Building Proposal

The Plan

This multi-purpose facility is designed to accommodate a wide variety of Scout groups and activities. This facility would be of significant benefit to Mafeking Rover Park, ensuring regular bookings in the future..

This facility will include:

- Sleeping facilities "Motel style" rooms capable of housing up to 4 persons in high standard
 accommodation and designed in such a manner that they could be easily be reconfigured to
 individual accommodation to house corporate clients. Each module would have self contained
 bathroom facilities. A separate module would be constructed to meet requirements for those
 requiring disabled facilities.
- Kitchen and dining Kitchen facilities suitable for catering for a large group and a dining space for eating.
- Meeting spaces In addition to the main room, several break out spaces are for smaller meetings.
- Verandah Outside sheltered areas around the building providing covered spaces to be outdoors in winter and reducing direct sunlight on the facility during the summer months.
- Toilet facilities including disabled toilets will also be located adjacent to the main building.
- Activity room in a central hall able to be used as the centre point for activities or as a main room for training and conference style events.
- Storage rooms and offices

This building would have significant long-term benefits to Mafeking Rover Park, the Rover section and the wider Scouting community. It has been designed to accommodate both Cub Pack Holidays and training courses, increasing the variety of bookings at the Park and supporting units and leaders in regional areas who currently have to travel large distances to access this kind of facility. Additionally, as a Centre of Excellence in "wheel and mechanical" activities, the facility would embrace the provision of a wide range of activities associated with this aim.

Location

The proposed location for construction is above Lake Surfmoot.

This location has many advantages:

Firstly, this location allows groups easy access to other facilities, which include the golf course and archery activities, and the water activities at Lake Surfmoot.

Secondly, we have been advised by the CFA that this site should have a low Bushfire Attack Level as it is in one of the clearest areas of the campsite with significant distance from any heavily wooded sections of the Park.

Finally, it provides a distinct second hirable area of the park away from the HG Hall and bunkhouse area, increasing the ability to host multiple parties onsite concurrently.

Attachment 4: Project Risk Management

Delayed Construction

Challenges through the construction process could result in delays to the planned completion date.

The multi-purpose facility will be a feature of the Park for many years to come.

Strong management of the development, planning and construction process will be essential to mitigate this risk. Utilising commercial construction will speed up the construction process and guarantee the building meets all safety requirements. This is increasingly important to ensure we meet best practice in this area.

Less Usage than Forecast

The estimates used for the forecasting above were quite conservative and included a range of mitigating factors. It is quite plausible that usage may exceed these rates, particularly as other aspects of the property develop over the coming years. This would seem likely given that Mafeking is one of the fastest developing Scout properties. If usage is less than predicted, the building will still bring significant additional value to Mafeking for current major events and its ability to tender for and host new events. Existing users of Mafeking Rover Park will also have an enhanced experience and the venue will provide a training hub for the northern part of the state, meaning this building will still be sure to return the value invested in it by Scouts Victoria.

Location of Mafeking Rover Park

Mafeking is approximately 2 hours north of Melbourne by bus and is perceived by some to be too isolated to be a successful major event site and campsite. This perception, however, has not proved a major issue in Mafeking being a successful major event site and regular Scouting campsite.

The location of Mafeking away from the encroaching suburbia is in many ways a strength, avoiding increasing issues with noise and neighbours encountered by other Scouting sites. Furthermore, as the city continues to grow to the north there are increasing numbers of future Scouts and Scout groups for whom Mafeking will be an exceptional weekend campsite. This is further complimented by the accessibility from the north of the state and the eastern suburbs of Melbourne via Yea. This means Mafeking is well positioned for the future.

Fire Danger

Like all regional areas of Victoria, the summer period poses bushfire threats to the Highlands Region which includes Mafeking. The Mafeking Rover Park Committee of Management is actively working towards limiting the risk that is presented to the Park on days of high fire danger. The Park has a current fire prevention plan which includes regular fuel reduction activities and the maintenance of fire services & systems to mitigate this risk.

On days of code red fire danger, as determined by the CFA, it is a requirement that all personnel must vacate the site. In the event that evacuation is required there are multiple routes which can be utilised to transport participants offsite. This significantly reduces the risk for participants to be stuck at the park if a route is cut off.

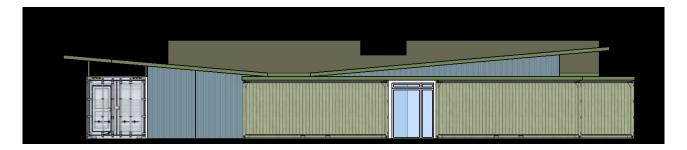
The planned Multi-Purpose Activity Centre construction site is well away from the forested areas of Mafeking in an area likely to have a low fuel load. During the planning phase it is anticipated that the fire risk will be incorporated into decisions on the style and materials used for the building.

Mafeking Rover Park has a detailed Risk Management Plan which incorporates actions to be taken in the event of Fire.

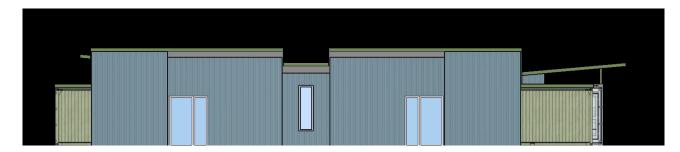

2024 Budget Cover Letter

> 7 – 10 June Mafeking Rover Park

Introduction

Mudbash is an annual motorsport event run by the Rover Scout section of Scouts Australia. Held at Mafeking Rover Park in Caveat on the King's Birthday weekend in June, it is the largest Rover Scout event in Australia with over 1500 participants and visitors annually. Mudbash puts the best aspects of Rover Scouting together. Among the weekend's activities are adventurous expeditions, competitive on-site activities, scouting camp craft, exciting nightlife entertainment, and of course motorsport!

Expectations of up to 700 people will camp on site for the weekend, although over recent years this number has been around the 600-800 mark. The Sunday of the event weekend is "Open Day", which is designed for members of the public and other scouts to be on site.

Mudbash is run annually at Mafeking Rover Park, which is owned and operated by Rover Scouts Victoria. The property is 319 acres in size and is in Caveat. The site is a rural/recreational property with several buildings, open grass areas and thick scrub in areas.

We have tried to keep the cost of the tickets reasonable while also considering the ever-increasing rates of inflation (General CPI Increases approx. 5-6% over the last two years) that affects the expenses of running the event. The ticket prices have risen to reflect and accommodate both the increasing consumer costs and the removal of the Rover Levy that was taken into account the previous year.

We have many capital works projects that we plan to undertake to get the park up to an operational standard to continue the use of Mafeking Rover Park for Mudbash and external hirers. These projects are listed in the budget breakdown below, however, to enable most of them to be completed it will require additional revenue (e.g. Sponsorship) not outlined in this year's budget.

Budget Breakdown

We have increased the cost of our presold ticket by \$1% due to keeping our ticket price in line with other major events as well as the increased cost of event related expenditures. The 31% increase also accounts for us not being able to increase our ticket price previously due to the rover levy even though in the first budget, we budgeted for \$75 which is the allowable 10% increase. See general note in introduction about cost of inflation that needs to be accounted for. This is inclusive of any store fee charged on card payments (2.2%) made on the Victorian Rover Scout Store which is a total of approx. \$1.90 per transaction. 1.2 We have removed budgeting for Gate tickets as per Financial Management Document requirements - lowest ticket price We have budgeted for the same number of tickets as last year however due to some confusion in the marketing last year - we plan to better market the event to 18 yrs olds as we have already changed the name of the ticket and increased PR to the venturer section. We have also increased this ticket by \$5 to help cover some costs we have incurred due to rising costs. 1.4 We have also increased this ticket by \$5 to help keep this in line with the increase to presold ticket. This was poorly promoted last year and we plan to push the promotion of this ticket to be more inclusive of those who cannot attend mudbash for the whole weekend - Great for Uni Students or people working over the long weekend. We have also increased this ticket by \$5 to help cover some costs we have occurred due to rising costs. We have adjusted the quantity to reflect current committee members and vacant positions. Underestimation of merchandise sales. We are subsidising committee jackets this year as they usually cost more than a ticket to Mudbash itself. They help participant's locate committee members, keep committee members with the harsh winter environment and are a tradition well loved by committee members. We are not budgeting for sponsorship this year as it is an unknown amount of income, a

Income we get from sponsorships and any money we do not spend in other areas are going to feed into capital works as much as possible. PROJECT 1: TOILET SAFETY UPGRADES: This project entails important updates to the toilet blocks to make sure there are cubical locks on either side of the bathroom doors in case of an emergency. This also includes upgrading the disability bathroom as it is in a poorly state and needs major refurbishment. These upgrades also may cover general maintenance required on the toilet blocks to make sure they are up to standard sanitary requirements to meet participant expectations at next year's event. PROJECT 2: NETWORK UPGRADES Replacement of the key parts of the network that's required to run Mudbash, this includes but is not limited to providing internet to hg, the snack shack, open day traders, first aid and the fish bowl, have a separate Wi-Fi network to run the ticketing system at front gate (this will also facilitate having the ticketing server in the server room), allowing internet access to activities at key locations 17.2 to facilitate things like movies or stem activities. PROJECT 3: COMMANDO COURSE: Another planned capital works project is to reburnish and update the Commando course. Currently, the course is overgrown, outdated, and rundown making it not safe for use for participants. This project works in conjunction with our track maintenance project to cut in a new Hill Climb track which will also double as a service road to access the Commando Course. As this activity is used annually by Mudbash, this will be beneficial towards the event and any other future events hosted by Mafeking Rover Park by improving the permanent infrastructure. PROJECT 4: KITCHEN AND FOOD HANDLING CERTIFICATION Aims to get the kitchen in the main hall complainant with commercially kitchen standards. PROJECT 5: FRONT GATE REBUILD Safety improvements to front steps and for PROJECT 6: PERMANENT SPEAKERS Install permanent PA speakers around main arena and into the campsites. Will thus improve main arena entertainment which was the main feedback from both motorsport and general participants from the previous Mudbash and support clear communication to the campsites and participants over the weekend of mudbash and future events held at the park. This has been adjusted to reflect a cost per head of committee members rather than an 17.5 arbitrary value to ensure that all committee members can be provided with an appropriate level of welfare. E.g. Water, snacks etc. With concerns this the previous rover led First aid team; we will be looking into hiring the 17.6 State scout first aid team based on their current quotes of \$2 per head on site. The 78% increase can be justified by investing into maintaining the racetracks/ service roads that have had serious corrosion due to the lack of upkeep due to multiple reasons including weather, working bee attendance, the pandemic and more recently the 18.1 Mafeking Rover Park tractor being unfunctional for almost a year. This budget also includes funds to resurrect a new Hill Climb which was one of Mudbash's major motorsport events which was unable to run last event due to the track being unsafe due to major erosion due to weather. This will now take more than just people power but

heavy machinery to fix. However, will be utilised for future events due to it being a staple motorsport track. We are in discussion with Mafeking Rover Park about the track also doubling as a service road to the commando course.

*Please note that the 2023 budget is not presented as line items have changed therefore breaking the sheet, so we have just included the totals – please see previous 2023 budget for a further breakdown of costs.

Closing Statement

Based on concerns raised by participants via event feedback from the 2023 event, the committee are aiming to improve the event for those who aren't participating in the racing during the day. We believe that our budget reflects this well as we try to utilise the money that our participants contribute to add back into both the event and the wider Victorian rovering community at large by way of supporting Mafeking Rover Park.

Due to unforeseen circumstances inclusive of the COVID-19 pandemic, Mudbash has unfortunately been unable to complete numerous capital works projects over the last few years. Due to this, the 2024 budget has included what we believe is a reasonable and justified capital works budget to inject funds back into the park and rovering, and to ensure that the facilities of the park are up to safety and legal compliance standards by the time of the 2024 event.

The committee have already liaised with Mafeking Rover Park on what capital works projects are required to effectively host Mudbash for the 2024 event. If these projects cannot be considered into the budget, the Mudbash committee may have to review alternative venues for the 2024 event thus affecting both participant and VRC expectations, and potentially puts the future of Mafeking Rover Park at risk.
