4.5 Quality Team

NRC:

Firstly, well done to both ACT and NSW Branch for pulling together the conference in times of varying natural disasters. The Friday of conference kicked off with all the reports from various teams; NRC executive, NRC project officers, National Operations team, and Branch reports. We moved on to elections for the new NRC executive; with the Chairman role being a two year appointment, Ezgi Bridger (VIC) will continue in the role until the next conference. Deputy Chairman went to Matthew Prants (NSW), Training & Development went to Danielle Reid (WA), and the Secretary role remains vacant for now. The Project Officer roles of Diversity & Inclusion and Marketing & PR were also filled.

The conference then moved onto a skill development session, where participants could choose between learning about Risk Management Planning, Conflict Resolution, and Operational Planning. The rest of the conference was focused on workshop sessions and plenary sessions. The workshop sessions have resulted in many smaller projects being proposed, all of which will be explained in the full minutes of the NRC conference.

For the plenary agenda, Victoria submitted 6 papers:

- Bullying & Harassment Policy Review
- Sexual Assault in Rovers
- National Moot Attendance
- Mental Health First Aid
- Drug & Alcohol Policy Review
- Adult Recognition Award Eligibility

The results of all these papers were positive, with no papers being voted down or withdrawn.

Bullying & Harassment:

Paper proposed we adopt the Scouts Australia Bullying & Harassment policy, as to not contradict a national policy, which also made a separate sectional policy redundant.

• Paper passed without amendment.

Sexual Assault in Rovers:

Paper asked for the possibility of an On Demand learning module on Consent/Respectful Relationships,



and a project patrol for a sexual assault policy. These are important to the Rover community in particular, as assaults in our section are not covered by the child protection policies already in existence.

• Passed with amendments.

National Moot Attendance:

This paper highlighted the declining number of Australian participants at our national moots; it was tabled for discussion. From the discussions an investigatory project patrol was proposed.

Passed with amendments.

Mental Health First Aid:

This paper focused on the lack of mental health support within the scouting movement and emphasised the impact of mental health problems for people between the ages of 18 and 24. It requested a timeline for the new On Demand modules being developed by the NOC and opened for discussion what more can be done to support Rovers by Scouting and the NRC. A project patrol was proposed.

Passed with amendments.

Drug & Alcohol Policy Review:

This paper tabled a policy update for the Rover Scouts Australia Drug & Alcohol policy. This policy had not been reviewed since September 2012; over this time, some of the policy points had become outdated.

Passed without amendment.

Adult Recognition Award Eligibility:

This paper was to approve a proposed changed to Scouts Australia's Policy & Rules document. As is possible in Victoria, we felt it important that all Rovers should be eligible for Special and Meritorious Service awards, where their service to the Rover section did not meet the eligibility criteria for a Rover Service Award (W.F. Waters in VIC).

Minutes

IT:

Thank you to the Regions who have sent in census data, we will be updating Extranet with the data we have in the next month or so. This month each Region has been given a list of crews that we know about in your Region - please have a quick look over this list and if there's anything that you can immediately see is wrong, please update it and hand it back to me at the end of the meeting. If you'd like a version to keep let me know. We will also be adding a form to the website allowing crews to update their details directly we will forward these to Regions as they come through.

Surfmoot was the first major event using the new ticketing/check-in system and from all reports it worked very well. We also had a chance to test the system's offline capability. We will be making some changes before Mudbash. Unfortunately we had some issues with the Point of Sale system wanting to do some updates after arriving on-site, which caused us issues. We are raising a support case with Square to see how to avoid these issues going forward.

Mudbash and MARB tickets are now on sale through the online store.

Any subcommittees wanting to take merchandise from the office please contact me first - we need to know what items are being taken to avoid inventory issues.

Our Email provider (Mailgun) will be making some changes to their pricing structure at the end of this month, eliminating the free plan that we have been utilizing. Unfortunately this means that we will need to start paying for our email services. Thankfully MailGun have offered us reduced pricing, bringing our monthly cost for the service to ~\$4 per month, which will come out of the IT Team budget. As part of this change Melbourne Region emails have been migrated to the main VRC MailGun account - please let me know if you have any issues.

Please note that Branch no longer supports using @vicscouts.asn.au and @vicscouts.com.au email addresses - if you are currently relying on an email address at either of these domains please contact me ASAP to arrange transition to @scoutsvictoria.com.au.

We have made some changes to the network infrastructure here at the Rover Centre, once testing has completed there will be a new Wi-Fi network to connect to. I will advise details of that change when it happens.

In the next month we will be putting together a proposal to purchase extra tablets before Mudbash - now that front gate check-in is using the tablets we need more to ensure we have enough to support Point of Sale as well as gate. We will present this proposal next month.

I have received several expressions of interest to join the IT team - I'll be reaching out to everyone in the next couple of weeks to have a chat and to organise a team meeting. World Moot Australia Proposal

At the National Rover Council (NRC) meeting held over the weekend 14-16 February, there was a workshop regarding a possible bid for a World Moot in 2029. The idea has previously been the subject of discussions at NRC and some preliminary work has been done. Should there be support for the bid to continue, there will be an enormous amount of work to be done in a short time.

Whilst it is recognised that the vast majority of current Rovers will be unable to participate as Rovers in 2029, it is, nevertheless, necessary for us to be committed to making a bid. At this stage, I am looking for each Region Chair to take the concept back to their Region for endorsement (or not as the case may be) and come back to the next VRC meeting with their support, or otherwise. I know that the timelines are short, but if we are to meet various deadlines then there is no delay.

Rover Crew Service Award

The Rover Crew Service Award for 2019 was presented to members of Manderson Rover Crew at the annual Founders Dinner organised by the Freemasons Baden-Powell Lodge on Monday 24 February. The night was very successful. On behalf of Rovers Victoria, I would like to express my thanks to Freemasons for their continued support with this award.

Could I again take the opportunity to remind Crews to maintain a log of service projects, participating Crew members and hours involved so that details can be easily tabulated when nominations are sought in November. More details are on the website.

W F Waters (Rover Service) Awards

It is time to consider those members of the Rover community and more broadly, who have given outstanding service to the Section. Full details of the award criteria and the nomination process are on the website. Due to the timetable for all awards, nominations should be forwarded to me by 29 February 2020.

Financial Management

I have received no comments in regard to the financial management document, which was appended to the agenda for the November meeting. I would now propose that this be adopted and be included in policy.

Finance

At the Leader of Adults conference on 1 February, the now State Commissioner, Finance & Business gave a presentation on a number of topics. Firstly was the advice that the membership fee for 2020/21 would increase by \$8-00 to \$240-00.

Secondly, his presentation outlined the concept of a "Scout Development Fund (Bank of Scouts)", which would see all investment level funds being required to be centralised. It is proposed that interest earned on these funds will be paid to formations at a "normal" rate of interest with any additional percentage being held by Branch for various purposes including building development, redress scheme costs, etc.

Such a proposal may have an impact on Rover operations, although there was a commitment that there would be no disadvantage to Groups/Formations and that funds would be available for withdrawal on a reasonable time scale.



At this stage, there is no further information and any "fine print" is yet to be developed meaning that is difficult to fully assess the impact of the proposal. However, it is prudent for us to consider how such a proposal, should it be implemented, may impact the Section. I will keep abreast of developments and advise VRC in the event of changes to our current arrangements.

A big thanks to Jarryd Sheehan for his work in running it again and everyone else who helped out over the weekend.

The Region is very proud of all of the Rovers from Mt Dandy who assisted in running Surfmoot this year, we did dominate the committee again this year and it's really good seeing Rovers help run events for the state as well as grow and learn new skills from the experience it provides. It was a really well run event, and we are impressed by the committee and all the work they put in over the past year, including the work they did behind the scenes. It is so good to see the enthusiasm from younger Rovers wanting to stay on and join because of the positive attitude that the older Rovers in the committee helped create.

We had a discussion about the Court of Honour policy and the feedback I have received from Rovers in my Region was the lack of openness and too much ability for anyone making a Court of Honour to abuse it. In the review of the policy, we would like to see more guidelines and clear instructions on how to proceed for any Rover running it, and for all parties involved to receive a copy of the findings of the report to help encourage openness from all Courts of Honour.

We would also like to see the positive outcomes from Courts of Honour to be included in the policy. A register that outlines, "A Rover was court of honoured for... and the outcome was..." would help Rovers in the future if they come across a similar problem.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

Introduction

Rovers Victoria owns substantial assets (Mafeking Rover Park, Mt Baw Baw and Mt Bogong ski chalets) and conducts a variety of events including Mudbash, MARB and Rover Dinner. Additionally, each Crew and Region operate various financial facilities.

This document is designed to be a guide for all Rovers elected/appointed as Treasurers for a Region or sub-committee. Whilst not exhaustive, the aim is to provide Treasurers with an understanding of financial management, development of budgets, handling payments and recording/reporting financial transactions.

The responsibility and importance for Treasurers to operate the relevant accounts accurately and diligently cannot be over stressed. The viability of assets and events is dependent on adequate financial oversight.

Bank Accounts

Each Region and sub-committee will operate a bank account which will record all financial transactions.

These accounts will be domiciled at Bendigo Bank and will be titled:-

Scouts Victoria, Rover Scouts, Region or sub-committee name.

Account Signatories

All financial transactions will be endorsed by two signatories to the relevant account. Normally these signatories would be:--

Chair of Sub-Committee/Region Chair

Region Rover Support Commissioner (as applicable)

Deputy Chair of Sub-committee

Treasurer

Rover Advisor

Additionally, the State Commissioner Rover Support and Victorian Rover Council Honorary Treasurer will be signatories to all accounts ex officio.

Budgets

Each Region should prepare an annual budget which should be tabled at a Region gathering.

Each sub-committee will prepare a budget, in consultation with the VRC Honorary Treasurer, for their respective entity and this budget will be presented to the Victorian Rover Council (VRC) for endorsement. In preparing a budget, Treasurers should provide a "Cover Sheet" which should provide comment on items which may require clarification/explanation. Budgets presented to the VRC will be under consideration for a month and be voted on at the following meeting. This period will enable any VRC member to contact the respective Treasurer with any items which may require clarification.

Items raised which require reporting to the VRC will be addressed at that next meeting.

In preparing a budget, Treasurers should be mindful of all anticipated revenue and expenditure over the reporting period. Whilst past years' experiences can act as a guide, Treasurers must ensure that proposals put to VRC contain the most up to date and accurate data. The costs of site hire, activities, fuel costs and merchandise, for example, can be calculated with reasonable accuracy given the known costs per item.

When all known income and expenditure data is available, the ticket price can be calculated and should ensure that the event/asset operates at a profit for the accounting period.

The budget should have a number of scenarios, based on different attendance levels, and should also include a contingency allowance which recognizes that occasionally there will be unforeseen costs.

A standard pro-forma budget is attached to this document and is to be used for reporting to VRC. The line items are examples only and whilst they may differ depending on the entity, **the template provided is NOT to be altered.** This will ensure consistency in reporting between entities and make for ready understanding by VRC members, recognizing that not everyone may have the same level of financial understanding.

<u>Income</u>

Income may take the form of bank transfer (direct credit), credit card or cash. With the establishment of the on-line store, most payments for ticket sales and merchandise will be received by way of transfer from

the 'store' account. Any other payments received by direct credit to the account shall be receipted and an appropriate entry made into the ledger.

At some events, 'gate tickets' will be sold and may be paid for in cash. Cash may also be received from some other sources. Any cash received should be appropriately recorded in the ledger and banked in a timely manner, either during the event where practicable, or as soon as possible after the conclusion of the event. All cash transactions will be entered into the ledger with the appropriate notation, and must correspond to bank account entries.

Ticket Sales

The budget should include up to three 'likely case' scenarios in regard to ticket sales. These should be based on both past experience and any anticipated changes in numbers for whatever reason, the ticket cost should then be determined on the likely outcomes.

For example, if the anticipated expenditure for an entity is say \$100,000, and the expected "other income" is \$10,000, then ticket sales would need to account for \$90,000 income. If the prior years' experience was for 900 attendees, and it is anticipated that this number will be similar for the current year, then the ticket costs would be \$100. This could be scenario 1. Scenarios 2 and 3 might be, for example, show ticket sales for an additional 100 participants, or 100 less, in which case the cost per ticket would be \$90 or \$112.50 respectively. These examples only provide an example of "break even" positions.

Expenditure

All expenditure is to be within the budget limits endorsed by the VRC. Whilst the Chair and/or Treasurer of the event may endorse different levels of individual payments within operational areas, these must still be within the budgeted limits. For example, the activities budget for Mudbash may be \$2000. Within this budget there may be an allowance of \$500 for model cars and \$500 for a jumping castle. If the jumping castle costs increase by, say \$200, and the model cars costs decrease by a similar amount, and there is no change to the overall allocation, then the Chair and/or Treasurer could endorse such changes.

Treasurers must obtain quotations for the provision of goods and/or services and invoices should be checked against these quotations. Where an invoice received is for an amount greater than the quotation, the quoted figure ONLY should be paid and an explanation of the differences requested from the supplier.

For expenditures in excess of \$1000, a purchase order specifying the goods/services will be prepared and given to the supplier who must quote the number in their invoice.

Reimbursement of expenditure will only be made on presentation of a receipt to the Treasurer. This receipt needs to be in the form of a "Tax Invoice" and should include details of the expenditure incurred, and GST paid (if applicable).

An EFTPOS RECEIPT WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

All expenditures will be recorded in the ledger with relevant references to receipts, and other specified requirements.

Payments WILL NOT be made in cash.

Ledger

All transactions will be entered into the on-line ledger system XERO. This provides for a standard level of recording across all entities and facilitates the ability to report accurately as well as claiming GST payments through the Branch accounting system.

Reporting

At the conclusion of the event and when all income has been received and payments made, a report will be prepared for presentation to the entity's AGM and to VRC.

A standard pro-forma report is attached to this document and is to be used for reporting to VRC. The line items are examples and, whilst they may differ depending on the entity, **the template provided is NOT to be altered.**



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Region Chairs Team proposal for Rover Dinner

03/02/2020

Since the 2019 Rover Dinner, there have been multiple discussions about Rover Dinner, and the format it takes, especially pertaining to who holds responsibility for its success, and therefore who holds financial responsibility. It is also worth commenting that, sometimes, for a variety of reasons, Regions struggle to form a committee.

One such proposal was that there be a 'dinner sub-committee' created, who run both MARB and Rover Dinner each year. The Region Chairs discussed this, and decided that in light of MARB being very close to Rover Dinner, and considering MARB struggled to profit in 2019, and have a very small 2020 committee; the Region Chairs do not favour this proposal.

As an alternative option, the Chairs discussed that given Rover Dinner is a celebration of Rovering for the year, it makes sense for the State Office Bearers team and Region Chair team to become the default 'Rover Dinner project patrol', under the following understanding:

- The Policy Book section on Rover Dinner will change so that each year the dinner is held in either a metropolitan region (as prescribed by the current order, continuing from 2015) or once every sixth year an 'away' dinner will be held, within Gippsland, Murray Midlands or South West regions, as determined by the Dinner Chair of that year.
- 2. The Rover Dinner project patrol will be chaired by a Region Chair who nominates themselves for the role, immediately after the previous Rover Dinner. They do not have to be the chair of the Region where the dinner is being held.
- 3. The Region Chair who takes on this position will hold the position for 12 months, regardless of whether they remain Region Chair for this whole period.
- 4. The Rover Dinner project patrol will involve all Region Chairs, the Assistant State Commissioners, State Commissioner, Victorian Rover Chair and Victorian Rover Deputy Chair.
- 5. Any surplus from Rover Dinner will be put aside to support the next Rover Dinner.
- 6. In the case of a large surplus being made by Rover Dinner, the Rover Dinner project patrol can elect a charity or specific Rover project to donate these funds to.

If this new model is implemented in 2020, the above changes of responsibility and finances apply. However, the 2020 Rover Dinner is being held in Melbourne Region, and chaired by Jacqui Willis, regardless of what model for Rover Dinner is decided on.

TRAINING REQUIREMENTS AND EXPECTATIONS

The Victorian Rover Council, recognising that Rovers completing Rover training is the most effective method to ensure that Victorian Rovering is led by young people who are knowledgeable in the aims, methods, principles and practises of Scouts Australia, resolves that the following shall be the level of training that is expected of Rovers undertaking the following positions. Positions other than those mentioned below are unaffected, although we also encourage Rovers in those positions to consider training, both for their current position, and for future planning.

- 1. Crew Leaders and other Crew Executive members are strongly encouraged to have completed Rover Basic training.
- 2. Region Chairmen shall have completed Rover Basic training, and ideally will be working towards Rover Advanced.
- 3. Subcommittee Chairmen shall have completed Rover Basic training, and ideally will be working towards Rover Advanced.
- 4. All VRC Office Bearers shall have completed Rover Basic training, and ideally will be working towards Rover Advanced.
- 5. The VRC Chairman, VRC Deputy Chairman, VRC Assistant Chairman and VRC Training Officer shall have ideally completed the Rover Advanced course and ideally have been awarded the Woodbadge. If elected to any of these roles it is expected that they will attend the next Rover Advanced training course.
- 6. Rovers who do not meet training requirements for a position will not be eligible to nominate for election unless an exemption is granted by majority of the Voting members of the relevant crew, Region or Victorian Rover Council.


