Induction Day

Thank you to all involved in organising this successful day, to those who presented sessions and to all who attended. Particular thanks to the Chief Commissioner, Brendan Watson whose introductory presentation was well received, and to the Deputy Chief Commissioner, Jon Willis, for his presentation and his involvement in the Finance session.

Rover Scout Motorsport

The position of Rover Advisor to RSM was advertised following Peter Gibson's resignation from the position after 5+ years support of the committee. The selection panel has recommended the appointment of Andrew Millsom who has had a long association with motorsport within the Section. Andrew's appointment is put forward for endorsement of the VRC.

Rover Advisors

A small number of Crews have in the past, and some currently, had two Rover Advisors. From a practical and administrative perspective this arrangement presents some difficulties.

Having 2 Rover Advisors can potentially create conflict and there is currently no provision on Extranet to register 2 Rover Advisors with the one Crew. Unlike other Sections where there is, for example, a Scout Leader and x Assistant Scout Leaders, the Rover Section does not have the same arrangement.



There are a number of arguments which support the concept of a Rover Advisor and an Assistant Rover Advisor such as Crew size, situations where the Rover Advisor is unable to be a regular attendee due to work commitments, or where the Rover Advisor has signaled an intention to resign at a future date, etc. It is therefore proposed that the VRC endorse the concept of an Assistant Rover Advisor who can work with the Rover Advisor and whose registration as such can be recognised on Extranet.

Executive Summary of Interim Report of Mudbash Review – Interim Report provided by Lachlan Preston

Background:

- Mudbash 2018 budget tabled November 2017, final version approved January with a proposed \$3334 profit. Budget noted \$32k in reserves in the bank and listed \$27,400 worth of capital works improvement to come from reserves.

Shannon Noll Proposal:

Proposal for Shannon Noll initially drafted by entertainment team with some likely costs,
 Chairman and Entertainment team key players in the initial proposal. Went to Jon Willis to underwrite the event, he asked for more information and quotes. Second meeting was held, advised Scouts Victoria would not underwrite.

Proposal to OBs:

- Chair and RA of Mudbash attended OBs meeting in February; discussion of plans included for entertainment, capital works and improved activities. Financial details of the agreement with Shannon Noll were limited due to confidentiality.
- Full budget not provided to the OBs at current or subsequent meetings. Proposal indicated risk of \$12k loss from Mudbash 2018.

Budget Confusion:

- Lack of formal budget meant Mudbash Tam and OBs leaving the meeting with different understanding of \$12k risk. OBs concluded the \$12k loss referred to the event losing that money, not including the reserves of \$32k, whereas the Mudbash Committee were proposing \$12k in debt post spending all the reserves as a result of the increase entertainment budget for Shannon Noll (accounting for extra \$35k \$40k above initial budget), plus planned capital works.
- Lack of updated budget to incorporate the changes to the budget, event Treasurer and Department Heads not provided with a revised budget. Different people were working off different budgets and assumptions.
- This discrepancy wasn't realised until lacked funds to pay debtors and the VRC needed to pay some bills, which triggered concern.

Other Issues:

- Budget relied on \$6k in GST claims from three previous events to balance the books, meaning it was already budgeted to make less than it cost to run in 2018. This claim was never made.
- Extra generic merchandise was purchased to be sold over multiple years. Significant amount left unsold.
- Entertainment has cost blow outs to their budget. Some were unplanned or unavoidable.
 Confusion about an LED screen being approved. Also, Entertainment team were working on Budget excluding GST, although may be common in industry, not common for Rover budgets.

Role of Treasurer:

- Treasurer predominantly not involved in the financial management of the event, including initial budgets and revised proposal to OBs.
- Treasurer also became unable to attend Mudbash meetings due to changing work conditions, his role from then on was limited. Treasurer was working to a different budget than the Chair and RA.

Technology Challenges:

- Tickets were released later than planned due to online store issues.
- Online payment system not installed, PayPal previously purchased was used, which included sizable fees and not available in a user friendly manner making keeping track of payments challenging.
- Committee using Xero for the first time with limited training.
- POS system for the event failed, meaning limited details of sales transactions.

Key Themes:

- Lack of communication/record keeping
- Lack of accountability
- Lack of process

Next Steps:

- Details being finalised
- Documents are still to be delivered, event books still to be finalised
- Written report will be tabled prior to October VRC with full report and list of recommendations.

- 6. Nominees must be eligible to remain a current invested Rover for the duration of the term.
- 7. Nominees must have at least 12 months experience serving on the VRC
- 8. Nominees must have completed the Training Requirements for the relevant position as stated in Policy: "T-4-0 Training Requirements for Positions"

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE VRC ASSISTANT CHAIRMAN

- 1. The Assistant Chairman is responsible for supporting and working with Activity & Event Teams
- 2. Organise and chair Sub-Committee Chairman meetings/workshops as necessary
- 3. Within the Office Bearers group lead a small team of Office Bearers as delegated with the other Chairman
- 4. Act as proxy for the VRC Chairman as requested or appointed.
- 5. Carry out duties as requested by the VRC Chairman, or by the VRC
- 6. Attend both VRC and VRC Office Bearer's meetings.
- 7. Produce an Annual Report by 30th June detailing the work done which is relevant to these duties.

NOTES

- 3. The election of these positions will be conducted following the rules and procedures set out in the Victorian Rover Council Standing Orders
- 4. The current delegation of the Office Bearer small groups is as follows:
 - a. Quality Chairman, NRC Director, Training, Strategic Plan, Secretary
 - b. Membership Deputy Chairman, Marketing, Communications, Vis Communications, IT
 - c. Participation Assistant Chairman, Resources, BPSA, Program



SUMMARY

Rovers Victoria is under increased financial pressure, with lower attendance at major events making the fixed event costs more sharply felt. Our current point of sale infrastructure costs \$1350 per year in point of sale software licensing alone, and depends hardware borrowed from past Rovers. Event subcommittees also continue to suffer from the challenges of ordering merchandise for sale onsite at events, writing off unsold stock or missing profits from popular items selling out.

I'm putting forward this proposal with the support of the VRC IT Team to address these and other challenges. Broadly, we envisage:

- Replacing MyEvents with an online store for purchasing of merchandise and tickets
- Replacing the existing Monitor Point Of Sale system with the Square Point Of Sale system
- Abolishing the Rover ID card payment method, with unspent money being returned to members
- Introducing the Square payment gateway with the online store and Square card readers with the Point Of Sale system for accepting bank card payments

This should give us an online store and a point of sale system that are easy to administer and easy to us, and save Rovers Victoria thousands of dollars over the next 5 years in the process.

CHALLENGES

- High ongoing costs
 - Rover events are suffering from poor attendance, forcing committees to scale back their events and limit fixed costs as much as possible
 - An annual fee for POS licensing doesn't fit well with our POS usage only a couple of days of the year
 - Over the next few years we'll have a number of software licences reaching end of life
- Dependence on borrowed equipment
 - The Monitor virtual server is hosted on a privately owned physical server
 - Much of the point of sale hardware we use is borrowed from past Rovers/their employers
- Complexity of onsite POS set up at events
 - The high turnover of Rover membership means that for Rovers to continue to run their own events, usability of systems should be a priority. Simple set up and configuration,

not dependant on a small group of individuals, is important for encouraging event organisers to make use of the Rovers Victoria POS system

- Lack of integration between websites
 - MyEvents lack integration with our existing VicRovers website. Merging these accounts avoids members having two separate website accounts, and the associated account activation, email update, and password change problems we see
- Impracticality of Rover ID card payment method
 - There is not and has never been a process for returning unspent money to individuals who cease to be members of the Rover section
 - Money can only be loaded onto the Rover ID card using the POS system or Monitor web interface by an administrator, leading to near double handling of transactions. Users que once to put money on their Rover ID card, and que a second time to make a purchase – this also means a duplication of staff serving the user
 - Users are hesitant to put money on their Rover ID card, as there are only a handful of events throughout the year it can be spent on
- Inaccurate merchandise ordering
 - The model of ordering event merchandise to sell onsite at the event leads to either customer frustration when stock sells out early, or committee financial loss from writing off unsold stock. It would be better if event merchandise could be pre-ordered through an online store and shipped to customers before the event or collected at the event
 - There is no avenue to continue selling event merchandise after the event has concluded.
 Unsold Rover merchandise could be sold through an online store throughout the year if people were found to manage packing and sending. Potentially this could be expanded to other Scouting entities

PROPOSED SYSTEMS

Establishment of a Rovers Victoria online store for merchandise and ticketing, integrating the Square payment gateway for bank card payments, replacing MyEvents and the Mudbash PayPal integration

 - RS Events Pro Joomla events ticketing module installed on VicRovers Joomla and integrated with
 - o J2Store Pro Joomla online store module installed on VicRovers Joomla, integrated with
 - Square payment gateway
 - o Existing vicrovers.com.au Joomla installation, which is hosted on
 - Existing VicRovers virtual private server hosted by OmniConnect
- Accepts payment methods
 - Bank transfers
 - Bank cards via Square payment gateway
- Ongoing/transactional costs
 - Customers pay 2.2% per bank card transaction
- Depreciation/expiring licence costs
 - The events booking module is a perpetual licence. Joomla upgrades may eventually make it incompatible, but we expect it to continue to be compatible for at least 5 years

 The online store module is a perpetual licence. Joomla upgrades may eventually make it incompatible, but we expect it to continue to be compatible for at least 5 years

Notes

- Few Joomla event ticketing modules are compatible with online store modules, the existing MyEvents module (OS Solutions Event Booking) is not compatibility with any online store so would need to be replaced
- The Square payment gateway, like PayPal, allows bank card transactions to be processed securely by Square so bank card information is at no stage handled by our own website
- The online store allows guest checkout, so merchandise/tickets can be made available to non-Rovers
- J2 Store Pro has the potential to be integrated with other modules for added functionality in the future

Introduce Square POS, replacing the Monitor POS and ID card transaction management, and abolishing the Rover ID card payment method

- Consists of
 - o Square bank card readers connected to Android tablets
 - Other POS peripherals connected to Android tablets
 - Square POS app installed on
 - Android tablets
 - Square cloud based back end interface
- Accepts payment methods
 - o Cash
 - Bank cards via Square card readers
- Ongoing/transactional costs
 - Customers pay 1.9% per bank card transaction
- Depreciation/expiring licence costs
 - Android tablets
 - Square bank card readers
 - o POS peripheral hardware (e.g. cash drawers, barcode scanners, kitchen printers)
- Notes
 - Square's business model is to make money from processing bank card transaction fees, their POS software is free. Transaction based charges fit better with our very occasional use of the system
 - Monitor POS has some more advanced features than Square POS, but we have never used nor see any potential use for these more advanced features, with the exception of the user ID cards management. The absence of these redundant features makes Square POS much easier to configure and use
 - The Android tablets, Square bank card readers and other peripherals are an upfront cost, but remove our dependence on hardware borrowed from past Rovers and their employers
 - Rover ID cards would still be used for checking on and off site at events, continuing to interact with OMS for this functionality
 - Square bank card readers are a relatively small upfront cost, meaning we could offer this
 payment method at more POS terminals than was feasible with EFTPOS machines

- Square POS allows receipt to be emailed to customers, removing the need for receipt printers. A kitchen printer would still be required for the canteen terminal
- o A couple of cash drawers or cash boxes would still be required for some terminals
- o Square POS offers integration with Xero accounting software
- Unspent money already loaded on Rover ID cards would be returned to the relevant members/past members

FINANCIAL COMPARISON

A number of costs are not affected by this proposal, including:

- New/replacement Rover ID cards: still used for checking on/off site
- OmniConnect VPS hosting: already used for hosting other VicRovers websites
- Jason Govan's VPS hosting: still used for OMS

Over the coming 5 year period (2019-2023), maintaining the existing systems would incur the below costs. Pricing may vary over time.


