SUMMARY

Rovers Victoria is under increased financial pressure, with lower attendance at major events making the fixed event costs more sharply felt. Our current point of sale infrastructure costs \$1350 per year in point of sale software licensing alone, and depends hardware borrowed from past Rovers. Event subcommittees also continue to suffer from the challenges of ordering merchandise for sale onsite at events, writing off unsold stock or missing profits from popular items selling out.

I'm putting forward this proposal with the support of the VRC IT Team to address these and other challenges. Broadly, we envisage:

- Replacing MyEvents with an online store for purchasing of merchandise and tickets
- Replacing the existing Monitor Point Of Sale system with the Square Point Of Sale system
- Abolishing the Rover ID card payment method, with unspent money being returned to members
- Introducing the Square payment gateway with the online store and Square card readers with the Point Of Sale system for accepting bank card payments

This should give us an online store and a point of sale system that are easy to administer and easy to us, and save Rovers Victoria thousands of dollars over the next 5 years in the process.

CHALLENGES

- High ongoing costs
 - Rover events are suffering from poor attendance, forcing committees to scale back their events and limit fixed costs as much as possible
 - An annual fee for POS licensing doesn't fit well with our POS usage only a couple of days
 of the year
 - o Over the next few years we'll have a number of software licences reaching end of life
- Dependence on borrowed equipment
 - o The Monitor virtual server is hosted on a privately owned physical server
 - Much of the point of sale hardware we use is borrowed from past Rovers/their employers
- Complexity of onsite POS set up at events
 - The high turnover of Rover membership means that for Rovers to continue to run their own events, usability of systems should be a priority. Simple set up and configuration,

not dependant on a small group of individuals, is important for encouraging event organisers to make use of the Rovers Victoria POS system

- Lack of integration between websites
 - MyEvents lack integration with our existing VicRovers website. Merging these accounts avoids members having two separate website accounts, and the associated account activation, email update, and password change problems we see
- Impracticality of Rover ID card payment method
 - There is not and has never been a process for returning unspent money to individuals who cease to be members of the Rover section
 - Money can only be loaded onto the Rover ID card using the POS system or Monitor web interface by an administrator, leading to near double handling of transactions. Users que once to put money on their Rover ID card, and que a second time to make a purchase this also means a duplication of staff serving the user
 - Users are hesitant to put money on their Rover ID card, as there are only a handful of events throughout the year it can be spent on
- Inaccurate merchandise ordering
 - The model of ordering event merchandise to sell onsite at the event leads to either customer frustration when stock sells out early, or committee financial loss from writing off unsold stock. It would be better if event merchandise could be pre-ordered through an online store and shipped to customers before the event or collected at the event
 - There is no avenue to continue selling event merchandise after the event has concluded. Unsold Rover merchandise could be sold through an online store throughout the year if people were found to manage packing and sending. Potentially this could be expanded to other Scouting entities

Establishment of a Rovers Victoria online store for merchandise and ticketing, integrating the Square payment gateway for bank card payments, replacing MyEvents and the Mudbash PayPal integration

- Rover ID cards would still be used for checking on and off site at events, continuing to interact with OMS for this functionality
- Square bank card readers are a relatively small upfront cost, meaning we could offer this
 payment method at more POS terminals than was feasible with EFTPOS machines

VRC IT Officer - Commerce Proposal

- Square POS allows receipt to be emailed to customers, removing the need for receipt printers. A kitchen printer would still be required for the canteen terminal
- o A couple of cash drawers or cash boxes would still be required for some terminals
- o Square POS offers integration with Xero accounting software
- Unspent money already loaded on Rover ID cards would be returned to the relevant members/past members

FINANCIAL COMPARISON

A number of costs are not affected by this proposal, including:

- New/replacement Rover ID cards: still used for checking on/off site
- OmniConnect VPS hosting: already used for hosting other VicRovers websites
- Jason Govan's VPS hosting: still used for OMS

- 1. The Assistant Chairman is responsible for supporting and working with Activity & Event Teams
- 2. Organise and chair Sub-Committee Chairman meetings/workshops as necessary
- 3. Within the Office Bearers group lead a small team of Office Bearers as delegated with the other Chairman
- 4. Act as proxy for the VRC Chairman as requested or appointed.
- 5. Carry out duties as requested by the VRC Chairman, or by the VRC
- 6. Attend both VRC and VRC Office Bearer's meetings.
- 7. Produce an Annual Report by 30th June detailing the work done which is relevant to these duties.

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared for the members of Victorian Rover Council, Scouts Australia, for the year ended 30th June 2018.

Honorary Treasurer's Report for the year ended 30 June 2018

The financial statements of the Consolidated Victorian Rover Council consist of The Victorian Rover Council; our three properties - Bogong Rover Chalet, WF Waters Lodge and Mafeking Rover Park; and five event and activity sub committees.

The Consolidated Victorian Rover Council has reported a turnover of \$580,856 for the year ended 30 June 2018 (2017-\$531,109) and a net surplus of \$12,750 (2017-\$27,337). The result for the year was assisted by the receipt of \$67,306 being the surplus from the Moot. Adjusting for this the consolidated VRC reported a deficit of \$54,556, driven mainly by a significant deficit in the Mudbash event.

As of 30 June 2018, cash assets equate to \$580,376 (2017: \$537,195) and total assets are \$1,309,578.

A breakdown of net assets (at cost) and income between Victorian Rover Council sub-committees is represented as follows:

During the 2018 financial year, the VRC moved all operations except for WF Waters Lodge onto the State financial reporting platform Xero. This is to assist with better management of our considerable receivables and payable balances, and seamless GST processing. We are also working closing with our IT team to establish more integrated payment processes for our future events.

Events and activities require careful management to ensure they continue to be profitable and value for money, and this year we have seen a number of failings in one of our events in particular, the outcome of which is unprecedented for the VRC. We are looking very closely at what has occurred, and in conjunction with the State Leadership Team anticipate that a number of significant policy changes and process improvements will be implemented to move forward within the Rover management model.

Despite the impact of the above, in our centenary year, the consolidated Rover section of Victoria remains in a sound financial position for the future.


